The focus of the International Outreach Committee this year will be the UNICEF Syria Emergency fund. The situation in Syria is worsening for children. The escalating violence is threatening the lives of all Syrian children. The reports came as a new terrible milestone was being reached: There are now more than 1 million refugee children who have fled the violence. Inside Syria, more than 3 million children are at risk.

The consequences of this war are truly catastrophic - an entire generation of children are facing critical shortages of clean water, and infectious disease run rampant. UNICEF has been on the ground helping children since the very beginning of this conflict. But as the war rages on, more funding is needed to continue lifesaving efforts.

The UNICEF Halloween boxes will be dedicated to the UNICEF Syria Emergency Fund, as will all the proceeds from the International Luncheon in January.
