National Alliance on Mental Illness

For the next two years, we, along with all the other NJSFWC member clubs, will be supporting NAMI New Jersey (www.naminj.org) through fundraising and awareness programs.

From NJSFWC

NAMI New Jersey (NAMI NJ) is a statewide non-profit organization dedicated to improving the lives of individuals and families affected by mental illness. Through education, support, advocacy and public awareness programs NAMI NJ fosters understanding about mental illness, confronts stigma often associated with mental disorders, advocates for public policies that benefit those affected by mental illness, and promotes research into the caus-

es, treatment and recovery of mental health disorders.

NAMI NJ was founded in 1985 by a group of concerned New Jersey family members who had loved ones with mental illness. At a time following the years of ,"deinstitutionalization" when care for persons affected by mental illness was severely fragmented, this group of family volunteers came together for mutual support, education and empowerment. They advocated for improved treatment and living conditions, not only for their own ill family member, but for all people affected by mental illness. From these modest formative years has steadily grown our present organization, composed of dedicated volunteers in our 21 local County Affiliates.



Looking Back

In 2015, the Porch Club will celebrate the 125th anniversary of its founding. The gem of an idea that became our Porch Club first began in 1890. The charter members: Mrs. Edwin C. (Mary) Grice, Mrs. Edwin Stevens, Mrs. John T. (Isabel Earnshaw) Murdock, Miss Amelia Coale, Mrs. Horace G. (Elizabeth Coale) Phillips, Miss Helen Lippincott, Miss Catherine Cowten, and Miss Cecilia Leavitt formed reading circles that met on the front porches of their Riverton homes. They had a mutual interest in improving the lives of children, especially through education. The eight women felt a calling to organize themselves more formally, and in October 1895, the first Annual Meeting of the Porch Club was held. Membership was initially limited to 25. Through their diligent work and passion, the women of the Porch Club helped to establish the first kindergarten class in Burlington County and influenced the forming of a "New Jersey Congress of Mothers," which became known as the New Jersey PTA. Mary Grice served as the New Jersey organizer for the National Congress of Mothers and was also the first President of the Porch Club. On September 28, 1900, Mrs. Grice and the "Mothers' Council" of the Porch Club put out a Call for Organization of State Congress which appealed to "All men and women interested in the work of the Congress (which should reach every home in the land), members of child study clubs, or section in other clubs, mothers, teachers and educators are cordially invited to attend." The meeting of the New Jersey Congress of Mothers was held on Saturday, October 20, in Calvary Presbyterian Church's Sunday School room.

In Mary Grice's own words, "The very most important event in the life of an organization, as in that of an individual, is the event of 'being born'." As we step into our 125th year, future articles will recognize and celebrate the lives of those women who answered the calling to grow and sustain the purpose of our dear Porch Club.

Palmyra Cove Tour


