Dear Ladies,

What a whirlwind of holiday activities! I hope you have enjoyed every minute of it and are ready for the spring. I know I am.

I want to thank everyone who helped and brought food for the Christmas Tea and the tea in January. What feasts we have!

During the last few months your executive board has been hard at work trying to decide how to upgrade our building facilities for the handicapped and for fire protection. The fire inspector took a tour of our building in October and cited us for several code violations. We have upgraded our fire detection system and our EXIT lights in case of loss of electricity. We are just about up to code. We have been given 9 months to get the side entrance fixed with exit signs and lights.

Discussions for making one of our bathrooms handicapped accessible and building an outside ramp have been ongoing for more than a year and a half. We made the decision that we needed to contract an architect to tell us what can and can't be done, the cost involved, and if the work is feasible without losing the historical significance of the building. We have contracted Hank Croft for this job. He is an expert in his field as he knows the ordinances and codes for the Borough of Riverton and the American Disabilities Act. As soon as we receive his information we will make sure the whole membership is made aware of his findings.

As Michelle Daniel said at the January meeting, our brick sidewalk is in dire need of a facelift. We don't want any of our members falling because of the hills and valleys where water and ice can accumulate. So, we have contracted with Steve Smythe to put in a new concrete sidewalk on the Fourth Street side. The concrete will fit in with the Howard Street sidewalk and our neighbor's walk behind us.

We will keep you apprised of what is being done with these projects.

On another note, be sure to come out to see 'The Ladies' Garden' quilt. It is a beautiful specimen of stitchery and teamwork by many of our women.



100 Years Ago: January, 1912 – rules for renters of the Clubhouse were developed and established. The Social Service Section inaugurated a Visiting Nurse Service. A Program Committee replaced the original Work Committee. The Finance Committee was formed in May. In July, Mrs. Edward H. Ogden, an original founder and generous benefactor of the Porch Club, died. The Social Service and Village Improvement sections were combined in October.

In November, 1912, the National Conference of Mothers met in Riverton; 112 delegates in all.
